## COCOA GAINS MOMENTUM FOR EXPORT WITH FAIRTRADE

Cocoa in Belize is becoming a popular crop that is growing for export as it expands into the international market. Cocoa farming originated with the Mopan Maya, where Mayan ancestors grew cocoa in southern Belize over 2,000 years ago. Ancient Maya elites used it for ceremonial and ritual purposes as cocoa consumption was carefully controlled by Maya nobles. Just as it is today, cocoa was a highly valued crop.

In today's world economy the FairTrade program ensures a minimum price for crops. Fair Trade also promotes environmentally sustainable practices ensuring that farmers use cultivation techniques that are safe for the environment and public health. The Toledo Cocoa Growers Association (TCGA) in southern Belize is a perfect example of how much FairTrade makes a difference. Agriculture is a central part of Belize's economy and citrus, bananas, sugar, rice, honey, and timber are its major crops. Cocoa is very important for TCGA's producers because it

is their main source of income.

The FairTrade movement, although still relatively young, is one of the fastest growing movements that links producers and consumers around the world. Its basic principle is straightforward: Pay farmers of tropical products a guaranteed fair price so that they can provide a decent living for their families. Coffee was the first product in Belize to break into mainstream retailing, but the palette of FairTrade products now spans a wide variety of items from wine to flowers and fruit juice.

Cocoa farmers in Belize are ready to face the challenges so they can satisfy demand on the

local and international level. If TCGA's efforts are to be fruitful, demand for Fair Trade must increase at the same time. By buying Fair Trade chocolate, partners can increase the effort to bring cocoa farmers the additional Fair Trade revenues they need so much.

In Europe, FairTrade products are present in virtually all supermarkets. In the U.S., acceptance has lagged behind, but Fair Trade USA reported that sales of fair-



trade products in the U.S. topped \$1 billion in 2007. Look for the FAIR-TRADE mark on products. It's your guarantee that disadvantaged farmers and workers in the developing world are getting a better deal. **EDIBLE FOODS ABOUND AT CAMINO**

Would you like to wake up in the morning and have a fresh banana and pineapple smoothie from the apple bananas grown right in your own backyard? Onsite at Camino Del Rio, you'll find some of the freshest and tastiest summer fruits and vegetables just waiting to be eaten.

provide a renewable resource is through the production of edible ones. Pineapples, bananas, figs, cassava, green peppers, and pumpkins, are just a few of the many edible items that are grown onsite.

All the fish that you can catch is just at the river's edge and if you're into lobster, then night fishing would be a must. Fresh Tilapia which is plentiful in the lower pond is a very environmentally friendly growing fish.

Come on down to Camino, and live off the land. While you are there, try this tasty recipe and enjoy a delicious hearty stew.

**Camino Stew**

**Ingredients:**

- 2 cups of water
- 1 16 oz. can tomatoes
- 1 pound of cubed chicken, fish, or beef (optional)
- 10 Chaya leaves, chopped
- 4 Cilantro leaves, chopped
- 4 medium Cassava, peeled and cubed
- 2 onions, diced
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Other spices that you enjoy in a soup

Combine all items in a large soup pot and cook at a low heat for at least two hours or until vegetables are soft. Serves four.

**NEW RECREATIONAL RESTROOM AREA UNDER CONSTRUCTION**

The recreational area of Camino Del Rio offers a number of activities to enjoy the outdoors. There are hiking trails, sitting areas, a bird watching tower, path to the river for cave tubing, and an outdoor patio for guests to enjoy.

Currently under construction in the southern portion of the area is the new restroom facility. This concrete structure will house two restroom toilets with a common sink area and will utilize renewable energy sources. Energy efficient lighting will be powered by solar panels with a battery backup. The water supply will be provided with a cistern and when necessary, water may also be retrieved from the nearby creek, pond, or river.

With the completion of the new building expected around the fall of the year, it will

be ready just in time for the upcoming season when more visitors are likely to be on the Camino property. It's location near the Patio area (also known as the Tiki Bar), will provide for convenience to all guests that visit and enjoy the recreation area.

**Adventure Activity Spotlight**  
**PARASAILING ALONG THE BEACH**

*It's a bird, It's a plane,  
It's a Parasailer!*

Want to feel the thrill of flying through the air like a bird in the sky? Parasailing offers a birds-eye view of what's below and fulfills the dream of flying like a human kite in the air. Parasailing is a recreational activity where a person is towed behind a boat while attached to a specially designed parachute known as a parasail. The boat then drives off, carrying the passenger into the air. If the boat is powerful enough, two or three people can parasail behind it at the same time. Today's parasail operators have evolved into highly organized and professional operations. Many of the largest operators are located in the Southeast US and Caribbean.

The "Parasail Safety Council", ([www.parasail.org](http://www.parasail.org)) which established the first commercial parasail safety guidelines and procedures provides the public with valuable information about parasailing.

Operators have moved from small (20-foot range) parachutes to large (30-40 feet) parachutes which utilize high-lift, low-drag designs enabling operators to fly higher payloads in lower (typically safer) winds. Most operators now offer double and triple flights using a tandem bar. The tandem bar is an aluminum bar attached to the yoke of the chute, allowing two or three passenger

harnesses to be attached side-by-side.

Typical parasail flights are performed with 500-1000 feet of line (normally made up of braided nylon), although some operators use as much as 2,000 feet of line. Flights may last up to 15 minutes per session based on the wind speed and amount of line.

Depending on your preference, you can land and take off without getting wet unless you request a "dip" at the end of your parasailing ride. No experience is necessary for this popular family sport.
